### German Language Courses, 5 credits total

It is recommended that you reach out to this contact at the point of application to confirm that you are applying to the appropriate language option for the BCGS Fall Term Program.
- Prior to final placement in the German language courses, you will complete an online placement test, after admittance to the program, but prior to your arrival in Berlin. Upon arrival, you will also complete an on-site interview to ensure adequate placement.
- You are required to enroll in two consecutive German language courses at the appropriate level. Placement into the second course will depend on successful completion of the first course.

### German Language Course Tracks

**Track 4:** Intensive Intermediate 2 (B2) + Intensive Intermediate 3 (B3)

Prerequisite: 3 semesters of German

**Track 5:** Intensive Intermediate 3 (B3) + Intensive Advanced 1 (C1)

As such, you will not be able to select any English-taught electives on the same afternoon as the German-taught elective so we recommend that you choose your German elective prior to ranking the electives taught in English.
